Dear Parents and Carers

May we begin by thanking you all for the numerous messages of support that you sent in recognising the commitment of the wonderful staff we have here at St George's; at times like these it is very much appreciated. Further to our letter yesterday we have now received more detailed guidance from the government as to the operational plans for schools to remain open, where possible, for a very specific cohort of children. The majority of our staff will be following government guidelines and working from home in order to ensure that quality learning can continue via Google Classrooms. This does mean that we will be operating with a skeleton staff and would therefore very much appreciate your close attention to the government expectations set out in italics below.

As a country, we all need to do what we can to reduce the spread of the COVID-19 virus. That is why the government has given clear guidance on self-isolation, household isolation and social distancing. And the most recent scientific advice on how to further limit the spread of COVID-19 is clear. If children can stay safely at home, they should, to limit the chance of the virus spreading.

That is why the government has asked parents to keep their children at home, wherever possible, and asked schools to remain open only for those children who absolutely need to attend.

It is important to underline that schools, colleges and other educational establishments remain safe places for children. But the fewer children making the journey to school, and the fewer children in educational settings, the lower the risk that the virus can spread and infect vulnerable individuals in wider society.

Schools are, therefore, being asked to continue to provide care for a limited number of children - children who are vulnerable and children whose parents are critical to the Covid-19 response and cannot be safely cared for at home.

Vulnerable children include children who are supported by social care, those with safeguarding and welfare needs, including child in need plans, on child protection plans, 'looked after' children, young carers, disabled children and those with education, health and care (EHC) plans.

We know that schools will also want to support other children facing social difficulties and we will support head teachers to do so.

Parents whose work is critical to the COVID-19 response include those who work in health and social care and in other key sectors outlined below. Many parents working in these sectors may be able to ensure their child is kept at home. And every child who can be safely cared for at home should be.

Please, therefore, follow these key principles:

If it is at all possible for children to be at home, then they should be.

Parents should also do everything they can to ensure children are not mixing socially in a way which can continue to spread the virus. They should observe the same social distancing principles as adults.

If your work is critical to the COVID-19 response, or you work in one of the critical sectors listed below, and you cannot keep your child safe at home then your children will be prioritised for education provision:

Health and social care

This includes but is not limited to doctors, nurses, midwives, paramedics, social workers, care workers, and other frontline health and social care staff including volunteers; the support and specialist staff required to maintain the UK's health and social care sector; those working as part of the health and social care supply chain, including producers and distributors of medicines and medical and personal protective equipment.

Education and childcare

This includes nursery and teaching staff, social workers and those specialist education professionals who must remain active during the COVID-19 response to deliver this approach.

Key public services

This includes those essential to the running of the justice system, religious staff, charities and workers delivering key frontline services, those responsible for the management of the deceased, and journalists and broadcasters who are providing public service broadcasting.

Local and national government

This only includes those administrative occupations essential to the effective delivery of the COVID-19 response or delivering essential public services such as the payment of benefits, including in government agencies and arms length bodies.

Food and other necessary goods

This includes those involved in food production, processing, distribution, sale and delivery as well as those essential to the provision of other key goods (for example hygienic and veterinary medicines).

Public safety and national security

This includes police and support staff, Ministry of Defence civilians, contractor and armed forces personnel (those critical to the delivery of key defence and national security outputs and essential to the response to the COVID-19 pandemic), fire and rescue service employees (including support staff), National Crime Agency staff, those maintaining border security, prison and probation staff and other national security roles, including those overseas.

Transport

This includes those who will keep the air, water, road and rail passenger and freight transport modes operating during the COVID-19 response, including those working on transport systems through which supply chains pass.

Utilities, communication and financial services

This includes staff needed for essential financial services provision (including but not limited to workers in banks, building societies and financial market infrastructure), the oil, gas, electricity and water sectors (including sewerage), information technology and data infrastructure sector and primary industry supplies to continue during the COVID-19 response, as well as key staff working in the civil nuclear, chemicals, telecommunications (including but not limited to network operations,

field engineering, call centre staff, IT and data infrastructure, 999 and 111 critical services), postal services and delivery, payments providers and waste disposal sectors.

If workers think they fall within the critical categories above they should confirm with their employer that, based on their business continuity arrangements, their specific role is necessary for the continuation of this essential public service.

We are grateful for the work of teachers and workers in educational settings for continuing to provide for the children of the other critical workers of our country. It is an essential part of our national effort to combat this disease.

A reminder of our requests from yesterday (with apologies for the unavoidable deadlines):

If you consider yourself to be a key worker under this definition would you please inform us by 2pm today (Friday 20th March) if you intend to continue to send your child to school next week to access the on-line provision offered to all other pupils. Would you please also provide updated contact details ie places of work and contact numbers. Please also supply any dietary requirements / allergies that your child has as we will be providing a morning snack and lunch for all students who remain in school. Those children who will be attending school will not be required to wear uniform. Please contact us as soon as possible either by phone 01474 533082, email offadmin@sgsce.co.uk or by coming in person to reception.

If your child is entitled to free school meals via pupil premium funding a packed lunch will be available for collection from the Olive Grove between 12 and 1pm each school day until 1st April. If you wish to access this provision please advise us by 2pm today (Friday 20th March) either by phone 01474 533082, email offadmin@sgsce.co.uk or by coming in person to school reception. Beyond this date we are expecting the Government to have introduced a national voucher system. We are awaiting specific guidance.

We are hoping for further information from Ofqual this afternoon in respect of the assessment plans to replace the exam season scheduled this summer for Years 11-13. We will update all parents and students from these year groups as soon as we know something tangible.

Please be assured that the wellbeing of our school community continues to be our highest priority and we will endeavour to respond effectively and efficiently to each new scenario that this unprecedented situation presents.
